Clyde: It was scary because there was lots of people. **Jake:** It was awesome. Next year I want to try the Buk'wus dance.




News from Erin and Mary Louise's Grade 1/2 Class

News from Sheri-An's Kindergarten Class

Gilakas'la! What a wonderful November we've had. As a part of our nature kindergarten class we are constantly engaging in issues that affect our surrounding environment. We have been learning about bears and discussing some of the reasons the bears are resorting to garbage, such as berry and fish shortages. Recently a habituated garbage bear has been causing problems in the village. It was unafraid of people and posed a threat to humans. As a result the bear was captured and euthanized by Conservation. When they examined him, he was missing all his front teeth from trying to get into garbage cans and unnatural food sources. He wouldn't have survived the winter. His death provided an opportunity to partake in a traditional healing ceremony to show proper respect for the that'yi. Trish lead a beautiful ceremony that sent the that'yi to the spirit world. She explained the importance of giving thanks to the bear and how its spirit will live on in the medicine that will be made out of the fat, and out of the hide, which will be used in dances.

This month we learned about clams and clam gardens and how to gather them. Uncle TK came and talked to us about the importance of clams as a healthy food. We were fortunate to have Uncle Johnny take us out clam digging. He even showed us how to make a clam garden. We were not able to keep the clams but it was good practice for when we go out again. He also took us to Chief David Knox's carving shed. The kids are excited about the coming Yayuma. December will be full of fun as we get ready for Christmas.


It's been amazing to have more elders in the building this year. We (students and staff) have so much to learn from our knowledge keepers!

News from Jackie



Our annual soccer tournament happened for three days in mid November. It was great to see our kids demonstrate sportsmanship and team play! Great to see so many parents!






