
News from the Principal




From the Vice-Principal


Sometimes in small moments like out in the at'ti.



News from Jenn's Grade 1/2 Class





News from Culture Class

Gilakas'la Li'łaxwala

In preparation for our Winter Yayuma 2019. Our main teaching is maya'xala - we teach all the sasam to respect self, others and our environment. With maya'xala as a guide they can learn our Gwa'yi'lelas - (our ways): language, history, songs, dances in a healthy way. We teach our sasam that we are bringing bakwam medicine to our family, friends, and community during the Yayuma. We have been sharing history of our Tseka Ceremony with the sasam. Every child in our school participates in culture class. As we prepare for

our Winter Yayuma our sasam have different roles to play: We have greeters, speakers, dancers, singers, attendants, artists, food helpers. We ask the sasam where they think their strength is for the winter Yayuma 2019. Some sasam prefer to be an attendant instead of a dancer. An artist instead of the speaker and so on. Each role in the Yayuma is important, we want every child to feel a sense of belonging and connection to our rich tseka ceremony. Most of all we want our sasam to feel a sense of pride in who they are and where they come from. We share the message that our Yayuma gives each one of us strength for our bakwine (spirit).

We encourage all our families to support our sasam as they prepare for the Winter Yayuma.

Encourage your child to participate with an open heart and mind in learning our <u>G</u>wa'yi'lelas - (our ways.) If you have questions please pop by and visit us.






